More room to move at bluesfest

 After 12 years at Red Devi Football Grounds, Bluesfest returns to Ballarat Fields. Festival director Peter Noble, is looking forward to a festival where people can stretch out and enjoy the comforts of a much larger site.

"It's really three separate fields with a tree line between each field, so with the setup we have you get a sense of a being three different festivals. The site is 28 acres, when you consider that Red Devil was 8 acres that's a big difference."

"The move to a new site was all about giving punters a more comfortable and enjoyable festival experience. When we first moved to the rugby ground we weren't so popular as we are now, people used to come and go more, it would be full for a couple of hours and then the numbers would go down again, but for the last couple of festivals, people just came and stayed and it was a bit of a quandary, do you stay on a site where it's successful or do you move to somewhere that will accommodate people better? You wouldn't expect to go to Woodford and not have anywhere to sit down."

"The sheer size of the site means that audiences are going to have the freedom to move around more easily. Friday, Saturday and Sunday we are expecting numbers of around 16,000 or 17,000 people, but Thursday and Monday will be a bit quieter because of the day in school holidays until two weeks after Easter. It will feel like a real local festival again."

"If you are attending Bluesfest it would be advisable to wear comfortable footwear as getting between stages is going to involve a bit of walking."

"You will have to get a bit mobile this year, but the sound bleed that used to happen at the Crossroads won't be occurring this year. When you walk in this year, that's the Apex stage, then the next field is Jambalaya, and then in the wooded area is the Juke Joint... we've had to put up a lot of fencing - every

area of habitat has been fenced off."

"The Bluesfest continued to show why they were the recipients of the Green Festival Award this year by avoiding the Major tent this year with a tree smack bang in the middle."

"The trees were there before we came in, so it seemed wrong to take them out. The Bluesfest has always had an enormous community energy, brought about partly by the enormous number of volunteers who help out on the event, just to be part of the atmosphere. We had 1250 applicants for volunteering this year - I think we are around 800 to 900 of those. There's people like Bruce the Pinc - he's into the recycling area, by mid festival he has got people doing impromptu plays within the area, around the recycling program. Volunteers get into areas

"It's too early to reveal the names involved, but we can tell you that this is a bumper year for Australian fiction and you can expect to meet the new young faces of literature and the household heroes and famous faces."

BYRON BAY EAST COAST BLUES & ROOTS MUSIC FESTIVAL 2009

She's the red-headed girl we all grew up love with the Audre Hepburn eyes, the 18 year high Doc Martens and the crying voice that declared its heartbreak in 'Nothing Compares to You'. It was her break-up in the night, that was the soundtrack. **Sioux Q Clear** is one of the eagerly awaited acts playing the Mojo stage on Friday. Q Clear's first single as singer for Tomlin Skelton brought her to the attention of the music industry. She produced her first album at just 20 weeks old and about 7 months pregnant. She was trained by her wife and her original song. She was also trained for her appearance: her shaved head, arched eyebrows, and sometimes shapelier or unusual coloring. The look and the concept was embraced by the mainstream on a large scale basis, but the album did eventually hit gold and status and earned a Best Female Rock Vocal Performance Grammy nomination. It was her album, *I Do Not Want Your Heart* that contained her inspirational breakthrough hit 'Nothing Compares to You', a song written by Prince and originally recorded and released by a side project of his. Added to a memorable and well-received video which solved confusion of her face as she sang the song, it became a massive international hit.

Also featured on Friday is the upstart **Leads**. Wainwright III. A single song and an act. Wainwright III's long list of accomplishments includes two Grammy nominations for the album, *From A Light* (1988) and *After Love* (1991), and a cover by Johnny Cash of his song 'The Man Who Couldn't Cry' for Cash's highly acclaimed 1994 album *American Recordings*. Wainwright's latest album, *Stinger* (2008), *Stinger* from and inspired by the film *Knocked Up*, was released in 2007. Wainwright has also been named by MOJO Magazine as one of America's most influential female commentators... initially compelling and emotional storytelling. Another curious plot for Friday is **Seaside Steve**. Leaving home at 15 weeks old with one a few crates, a hooded bag and his guitar, Steve was in the streets scoring going hungry, working for handouts, 'tright' hopping across the States and posing for food. After work on the road, Steve made the move to Melbourne where he released his first album *Cherry* in 2004 with the label *David*, followed by *Dog House Blues* in 2005 at the first UK release on appearance on *Just a Hint* (UK Annual *Hottest* in *Sound* on *New Year's Eve*). The BBC review said of Steve: 'His tone-bone blues is simple, tight and full of authentic emotion. As intended, Seaside Steve, he remains as humble and as unaffected as the boy who left home at 15. I don't think I've ever seen a more authentic blues act in the UK since I don't even think of myself as a blues person, more like a singer and a kind of folk', he says. 'I just let the people who come and see me figure it out.' *Voiced by Mojo as breakthrough artist of the year for 2007.*
